Quarterly General Meeting Wednesday, August 14th — Special Guest Speaker:

Clint Shealy, Assistant City Manager for <u>Columbia Water,</u> will provide an overall update about key issues and initiatives for the City's water and wastewater utility. Topics will include an update on the recovery of the Columbia Canal, water quality news, and customer service improvements. Please plan to join us for this informative briefing.

Forest Friends: It's too hot to plant trees right now, but you can take care of existing trees, especially newer ones, by mulching underneath them, and you can order a free tree for cooler weather!

MULCHING – Key points in mulching are to **keep the mulch AWAY from the tree trunk by at least 6** inches, more for larger trees, and **mulch no more than about 3 inches in depth**.

- Mulch that touches the trunk encourages rot and infestation.
- Mulch that is too deep can actually smother the roots and prevent water from getting into the ground.
- The best mulch is free! Use the leaves or pine straw that fall off the trees in your yard. Retain the nutrients the trees have drawn from the soil to grow and produce the leaves rather than throwing them away!
- If you buy mulch, make sure it doesn't have added dyes or chemicals (many of the bagged mulches do!).

<u>FREE TREES FOR THE FALL AND WINTER</u> – In lieu of our neighborhood annual tree give-away, see the links below for how to get a free tree through the City of Columbia and Columbia Green. They have received a grant to help reduce urban heat through tree planting.

- * Trees can reduce summer temperatures up to 10 degrees.
- * Trees that shade buildings can reduce AC energy costs by 10-50%!
- * Trees create a healthier environment by capturing water runoff and air pollutants.

Note that these trees can be planted anywhere in your yard and are larger than the typical trees our neighborhood gives away. You will be responsible for planting and care, but the program delivers the tree and "tree diaper" that helps with watering.

We have recently installed two gateway signs at each end of Wilmot to welcome people to our neighborhood and remind us all to love our delightful urban forest. Thanks to Dave Johnson and Lani Stringer for the branding and design work and Pat Mason for the grant paperwork, fabrication coordination and persistence with SCDOT on installation options. We plan to install 6 more signs in the next few years as funding allows.



Our thanks to Larry Hembree and Henry Nechemias for tackling a massive pile of paperwork to reinstate our charity status as a neighborhood association. This helps pave the way to getting an Art performance grant, that will lead to an Arts in the Park event at the USC Belser Arboretum (date TBD).

The City and County have been given additional funding to share with our neighborhood for trees and park development (see Forest Friends article above).

In coordination with the Sherwood Forest Presbyterian Church, we are seeking funds to incorporate a dog park, native garden, and land reclamation project. This will take several grants, commercial development, legal support and time – probably three years. We have the support of the City Parks and Recreation and our neighbors. I must publicly recognize my Vice President, Pat Mason.
